

The Texas Horned Lizard Reintroduction Project: Preserving a Texas Icon

Presenter: Dr. Andy Gluesenkamp, Director of Conservation, San Antonio Zoo's Center for Conservation and Research

The Texas Horned Lizard, the most iconic Texas reptile, was once abundant throughout a large range. Today, Horned Lizard populations have declined or disappeared in many places in Texas. Habitat loss and invasive species (pesticide use, exotic grasses, and red imported fire ants) are frequently implicated in the decline. However, sufficient areas of suitable habitat exist where the lizards may be reintroduced and many landowners are engaged in landscape management practices that are conducive to Horned Lizards.

To preserve the abundance of the **State Reptile of Texas**, San Antonio Zoo launched the **Texas Horned Lizard Reintroduction Project**, which Dr. Andy Gluesenkamp will discuss with us. The project involves producing large numbers of lizards in



captivity and then releasing them into predetermined habitats that can support the species. The program relies on GIS data, genetics, and current knowledge about Horned Lizard ecology and distribution.

Registration is a two-part process.



San Antonio Christmas Bird Count



TENTATIVE Date is Sunday, December 20

To say the least, this year has been an interesting one for birding, as well as with COVID-19. Following the guidance from National Audubon, we will wait until November 15 at the earliest to decide if this year's San Antonio Christmas Bird Count (CBC) will be a go or not, if local rules allow:

- We will strive to run a COVID-19 safe and socially distanced CBC.
- Activities will comply with all current state and municipal COVID-19 guidelines.
- Social distancing and/or masking are required at all times in the field.
- Carpooling may be used to divide into smaller subgroups and will be encouraged to occur within existing familiar or social "pod" groups.
- We are canceling the countdown dinner that has been used in the past to compile group numbers and submit Rare Bird Documentation.

participating. We anticipate groups start as early as 7:00 AM and remaining in the field up to 7:00 PM.

PurpleMartins78209 Project By Allison Hayne

One of the important migratory bird species in Texas is the Purple Martin, North America's largest swallow. Purple Martins winter in South America, primarily in Brazil. In mid-January, Purple Martins begin showing up along the Gulf Coast of North America. Their breeding range in Texas includes most of the state except the Trans Pecos region.

East of the Rocky Mountains, Purple Martins nest exclusively in

human-supplied housing because of loss of habitat and competition. To ensure successful nesting, housing must not be impeded by tall trees within 30 to 40 feet with wide-open flyways. Entry holes must be resistant to European Starlings and houses must be accessible for regular inspection to help control competition from introduced species such as the House Sparrow and European Starling. For housing located in the country, a predator guard is a must to



keep snakes from climbing poles and eating whatever they find inside.


Thanks to many generous donors, my husband, Elliott, and I purchased a 12-gourd rack and installed it close to St. David's Church in Terrell Hills. With permission from the City of Alamo Heights, we have assumed responsibility for the two Purple Martin houses on Viesca St. at the Judson Nature Trails and at the Alamo Heights Little League fields. We received financial backing from local residents as well as support from Bexar Audubon Society to make necessary repairs to the existing T-14 Purple Martin houses at those locations. We have observed successful nesting pairs at all of these sites.

We are in the process of having signage made for each of the bird house sites and thank San Antonio Audubon and Bexar Audubon for their financial assistance with two of the signs.

Limited timed entry tickets are available for staggered arrivals every 30 minutes. No late arrivals (more than 15 minutes) will be permitted. Visitors may stay on-site until closing regardless of entry time. Please note that gates will close at noon. Please make sure you have exited the property by noon regardless of your ticket time.

SAAS Big Sit Recaps

Fall migration has brought many interesting species through our area, with a Pileated Woodpecker, Lazuli Bunting, Cassin's Vireo and Black-throated Sparrow at Warbler Woods; a Sage Thrasher in Stone Oak Park; Surf Scoter and Brown Pelican at Braunig Lake; Blackbellied Plover and Red-bellied Woodpecker at Mitchell Lake Audubon Center, and early arrivals of American Goldfinches and Cedar Waxwings in various areas.

SAAS scheduled some Big Sit-type outings in the past few weeks in birding hotspots conducive to sitting in one area, wearing masks, and social distancing.

October 2: Three SAAS members joined fellow SAAS member, Sandi Wheeler, for a nice morning at Warbler Woods. Highlight for the morning was a Great Horned Owl gliding quietly through the trees. We all enjoyed getting together



with those we haven't seen in many months. Social distancing kept us all safe. Thank you to Susan and Don Schaezler for sharing their wonderful bird sanctuary with us all.

October 15: Mariann Golden reported that during a Big Sit at Olmos Basin Park, Northern Cardinals, Eastern Phoebes, White-Winged Doves, Black-crested Titmice, Carolina Chickadees, Rubycrowned Kinglets and Orange-crowned Warblers were all seen. A surprise find by Mariana Outlaw was a Common Nighthawk sitting on a limb.

Be watching for more social-distanced field trips as SAAS finds ways to get together safely.
